Valued services face budget axe

By Adam Postans, LDRS reporter Meals on wheels, pest control and the much-loved HandyVan household repairs service face the axe under South Gloucestershire Council's budget plans.

The authority says that although they are highly valued by residents, council taxpayers are subsidising all three and the organisation is not legally required to provide them.

As part of the 2026/27 draft budget consultation, the council is asking for people's views as it considers options to either make the services cover their own costs or stop providing them completely.

The consultation said: "Through our budget-setting

Town council urges

Summer 2026. The proposed suspension would last until at least 30 June 2027, with ongoing feedback to be assessed by the full council.

Leading the initiative are Deputy Mayor Cllr Brian Mead and Chair of Finance Cllr Dan Harris, pictured right, who say the move reflects strong community support.

"Both Cllr Mead and I were approached by several constituents in Conygre Ward who questioned why the bus gate remains closed to general traffic during peak hours," said Cllr

Harris. "I ran a focus group on the News and Views Facebook page, and the sentiment was overwhelmingly in favour of opening it up fully. We're proud to represent the people's views and believe we can bring a compelling case to South Gloucestershire Council."

Currently, the bus gate restricts access to taxis, motorcycles and cyclists between 7–10am and 3–7pm Monday to Friday.

This part-time operation was made permanent in 2022 following an experimental traffic


At the time, council officers acknowledged that the bus lane did not appear to be strictly necessary, but emphasized its role in managing traffic flows and



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preserving priority access during peak hours.

During peak hours, drivers wishing to continue south on Filton Avenue need to turn left onto the ring road and return

to Filton Avenue at the the Brewers decorating shop via the Abbeywood roundabout.

"Whilst it is recognised that the Bus Lane does not appear to be currently needed," the 2022 report stated, "it provides an effective method of controlling traffic flows from Filton Avenue north to south while maintaining direct access for other priority vehicles during peak times.

Making its operation part time increases accessibility and convenience for local residents without risking increased congestion and incidents during peak hours."

Despite these arguments, Filton councillors believe the landscape has changed. With no active bus service on Filton Avenue North and growing frustration among residents, they argue that a new trial is warranted.

The motion calls for South Glos Highways to engage in dialogue and consider structured suspension, monitored closely by Filton Town Council.

"This isn't about disregarding safety or planning," said Čllr Mead. "It's about testing whether full access can work better for our community today. We're asking for a fair trial, not a permanent change.'

As the town prepares to make its case, the proposal sets the stage for renewed collaboration between local and county councils-and a fresh look at how Filton's roads serve its residents.

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Plans to build 36 homes on the former Charborough Road school playing field remain highly contentious in Filton, following a public presentation and Q&A session hosted by Filton Town Council at Elm Park.

The meeting gave residents the chance to question South Gloucestershire Council and its development partner Aequus about the revised proposals. A final decision on the plans has not yet been made by South Glos Council. The application, which can be found at www. developments.southglos.gov.uk/online-applications, proposes:

- 36 homes: a mix of 1-2 bed apartments and 2-3 bed houses.
- 35% affordable housing: including social rent and shared ownership.
- 61 parking spaces: eight visitor bays and one disabled space.
- Sustainability features: air source heat pumps, solar PV panels, high-performance glazing.

• Retention of mature trees and new hedgerow planting.

Proposals to build on the site have been met with strong opposition from residents, particularly those in Charborough Road, Dunkeld Avenue and Clyde Grove, whose homes back onto the land.

Common themes include flood risk, traffic safety and parking, safeguarding, inadequate consultation and loss of green space.

The public meeting, attended by around 40 local people, heard concerns on a number of topics, including road safety, with the entrance to the proposed new development just yards from the gates of Charborough Rd Primary School.

One resident said it was 'an



accident waiting to happen while many commented on the parking issues which would arise if there were not enough spaces in the development.

Other people attending the meeting said the designs of the new homes were not in keeping withe the rest of the area.

They also said there were worries that drainage issues could arise from rainwater running off from the scheme while others said the height of the apartment block would lead to a loss of privacy.

An architect on the scheme told the meeting that concerns that biodiversity, specifically badgers, would not be affected, but this was strongly rejected by residents.

Council officers said the scheme meets policy requirements for urban infill and aims to deliver "net-zero ready" homes aligned with the Future Homes Standard (2026). They highlighted improved pedestrian and cycle access, shared surfaces to slow traffic, and buffer planting to protect school boundaries.

To address objections raised during statutory consultation, the council and Aequus cited:

Traffic and parking: Parking provision is compliant with Policy PSP16.

Safeguarding: Balconies on





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plots 15 and 16 will be redesigned to limit overlooking; buffer planting added.

Wildlife: Tree and hedgerow retention; bat boxes installed; badger surveys found no evidence of activity.

Flood risk: Site classified as Flood Zone 1 (low risk); drainage strategy submitted.

Despite these assurances, local objections remain fierce.

Comments as part of the planning process included:

- "The message we are getting is that South Glos seems to be able to do what it likes. Once gone, the school will never be able to expand."
- "The cul-de-sac design will funnel traffic into an already congested area near the school, putting children at risk.'
- "We've already seen water pooling since the MUGA was installed. Adding more hard surfaces will make flooding worse."
- "Three-storey flats are completely out of character for this area.

runs Charborough Rd Primary School, raised safeguarding concerns, warning that balconies overlooking the school playground could compromise pupil safety.


In August 2024, Filton Voice reported strong opposition from local residents to the proposal.

At the time, the council defended the scheme, stating that it would deliver muchneeded housing, but campaigners vowed to continue pressing for changes.

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'End of an era' as Filton bakery closes after 34 years

A once-popular family-run bakery has been forced to close its shutters for good after 34 vears in Filton.

Blighted by the uncertainty over the flats above, the shop in Church View closed at the end of October.

Last November, landlords Bromford Housing Association announced its proposals to regenerate the site "to provide alternative affordable housing".

Down's Bakery - founded 42 years ago in Gloucester Road - was given two years to leave the premises, but owner Diane and daughter Sam explained that a year later, only a handful of families remain in the flats - a situation which has had a detrimental impact on sales.

Diane said: "(The situation with the flats) has destroyed a business that has been running for 42 years."

She explained that when they first started trading, they had "a queue out the door".



However, Covid-19 also took its toll on the beloved bakery.

Sam said that after the pandemic hit, the business "fell from under their feet" as they heavily relied on sales from Airbus employees who were forced to work from home.

Other shops on Church View have also closed, with no new businesses taking over the empty spaces. Despite the setback, Sam and Diane expressed their gratitude as they continue running their second bakery in Severn Beach.

However, the closure of their Filton shop has changed the way they operate.

One shop cannot sustain the whole family's wages, Diane explained.

Many locals have shared fond memories of the bakery on its Facebook page.

Regulars have marked "an end of an era", praising its signature bread pudding and the staff's amazing attitude.

The bakery was set up in Filton in 1981 by Diane and her late husband Christopher, after moving from Gloucester Road.

The family business bursts with a "mother's pride", Diane says, with trade being passed down through generations and expanded where they opened their second shop in Severn

Nowadays, Diane describes herself as a "silent partner" as her children continue the legacy.

The Down's Bakery shop at Severn Beach receives lots of business due to its busy location.

Unfortunately, they do not have the commercial space to bake bread, but they offer plenty of choux buns, tarts and other baked goods.

Green aviation on show as transport secretary visits Filton

Filton MP Claire Hazelgrove says she is proud to have recently welcomed the Secretary of State for Transport to Airbus.

Heidi Alexander visited Airbus's Filton site on October 30, alongside Ms Hazelgrove, to discuss the site's role in shaping the future of sustainable aviation.

It follows the government's recent introduction of the Sustainable Aviation Fuel (SAF) Bill, and its efforts to support growth and job creation in the UK aviation sector, while upholding commitments to clean energy.

Ms Hazelgrove, Labour MP for Filton and Bradley Stoke, said: "I was proud to welcome Transport Secretary Heidi Alexander to Airbus' fantastic site here in Filton.

"Airbus is – of course – a major local employer and a leader in aerospace design and sustainability.

"As we know locally, our heritage and future are steeped in shaping in the future of flight,



and it is excellent to have this recognition for our community from the highest levels of government."

During the visit, the two politicians met with Airbus engineers, apprentices, senior leadership and Unite union representatives.

Their visit included a tour

of the Aerospace Integrated Research and Test Centre (AIRTeC), a £40 million facility co-funded by Airbus and the Aerospace Technology Institute, which supports the development of next-generation aircraft technologies, including hydrogen propulsion and lightweight composite materials.

It also coincided with Airbus announcing a major order of 100 A321neo aircraft from Vietnamese carrier VietJet.

The A321neo can operate with up to 50 per cent SAF with plans to achieve full 100 per cent SAF capability by 2030.

Ms Alexander said: "It was fantastic to visit Airbus in Filton today, and to see some of their world-class innovation in the future of flight and meet talented workers at every career stage.

"I was glad to congratulate Airbus on their major investment from VietJet, which is a big vote of confidence in British aerospace and engineering, and will support jobs across the country to deliver our Plan for Change."





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Council blames Tories for 'black hole' in budget

Opposition Conservatives have criticised South Gloucestershire Council's ruling Lib

Dem/Labour coalition for "broken promises" in its budget plans.

But the administration has hit back, saying it has protected the authority's most vital services and that 14 years of Tory government austerity cuts had slashed funding, leaving the organisation with a financial black hole.

Conservative group leader Cllr Sam Bromiley, pictured, said: "These plans amount to a budget of broken promises and misplaced priorities. At a time when families are already struggling with the cost of living, it's outrageous that residents are being asked to pay more for services that are being cut."

Continued from page 1 process, we have looked at all possible options before cutting services.

'We are in a relatively financially stable position, but this has only been possible because we have taken difficult decisions early.

"Therefore, given the cost pressures and uncertainties around our future funding, we think we will need to continue this approach of planning ahead and make some cuts over coming months and years.

"Our community meals service is currently losing more than £125,000 per year - or approximately £2.20 for every meal we deliver.

"These losses have increased markedly in recent years when the price people pay for their meals has been frozen at a heavily discounted rate during a period when our main costs (food, energy and wages) have risen sharply.

"We cannot continue to use the money local people pay in council tax to subsidise meals.

'We therefore intend to increase the amount people to pay to help offset some of these losses."

The draft budget assumes an increase in Council Tax next year of 4.99 per cent. The Government assumes councils will raise their taxes by this amount each year, and each 1 per cent increase is expected to bring in around £1.9 million in extra funding.

The council said it would consider options to stop subsidising the HandyVan service, which provides plumbing, carpentry, flooring, bathroom and kitchen adaptations, painting and decorating, fencing, and even flat-pack furniture building, and offers discounted rates to over-60s and people with disabilities, as well as working in schools.

The consultation said: "Due to financial pressures, the council needs to focus on services it is legally required to provide and those that support the most vulnerable people, such as children in difficult situations. older adults, and disabled people who need social care.

"While the HandyVan service is valued by customers, it does not meet these criteria and consistently does not cover its

It added: "The council's pest control service has many happy customers. However, this is not a service which the council must provide and there are companies in the private sector who offer a good value alternative."

Other cost-cutting measures include cutting funding to town and parish councils for public toilets and parks. South Gloucestershire Council is also reviewing services it delivers to schools on a commercial basis.

Cultural funding to boost creativity on high street

"Whether you're voluntary, community or social enterprise, or a town or parish council, we are encouraging organisations to apply for the grant so we can develop and nurture ideas that benefit the local community."

Helen Godwin, Mayor of the West of England, said:

"Bringing a broader mix of cultural activities and events can encourage people to spend more time in our town centres, ultimately helping local businesses to thrive.


"This regional funding, backed by the council, is a real opportunity for local communities in South Gloucestershire to come up with new ways to add even more character to some of the West's high streets.

A new St Peter's Hospice charity superstore has opened in Abbey Wood retail park

The supersized charity shop is the third to open in Bristol, and they're looking for volunteers.

The shop mostly stocks larger household items, following customer demand, as well as a smaller section for clothing and accessories.

The opening follows success from the first two superstores in Clifton and Portishead.

The charity also offers a free collection service, making it easier for residents to support the hospice's mission and get rid

of their unwanted furniture in a

sustainable manner. St Peter's Hospice retail director John Broomhead believes that the superstore could provide "an invaluable service" to those people who are looking to furnish their homes, but are struggling with the ongoing cost of living crisis.

Amanda Cook, an interim supervisor at the Abbeywood store, previously worked as a volunteer for the hospice.

As she has progressed through the charity, she says she has learned new skills and grown in confidence.

She claims that when you work as a volunteer, "you get a lot of help and a lot of support."

Claire Hazelgrove, the MP for Filton and Bradley Stoke, was present for the grand opening of the store.

She noted that the hospice supported 329 people in the area last year, where the charity prides itself on making a meaningful difference to the community.

She commented: "I'm proud to welcome the shop and its dedicated team to Abbeywood."

The charity operates more than 40 shops in the wider Bristol area and was recently named the 2025 'Outstanding Charity Retailer'.

Stronger financial performance allows council to create more festive cheer

Our budget for this financial year contained a line to support Christmas events and decorations etc of £15,000.

The Council restructured the budget with the collapse of the previous leisure provider to reopen the centre and work towards a sustainable business and another long-term service provider; and the Christmas budget was cut. However, the Council maintained its commitment to erect festive lighting around the retail areas (these were deployed late October, at a cost of just under £6000).

Due to the strong partnership between Parkwood Leisure, Filton Town Council, staff in both organisations, residents and of course customers; The Council is now paying less each month in support of Elm Park Leisure Centre, from which the Council can start to review the emergency budget arrangements with a view to returning close to the original budget.

The first budget line for review is the Christmas Festivities budget which was originally £15,000. At the Finance Committee on 11th December, the Council resolved (voted) to reinstate part of the original budget for Christmas events and decorations of £10,000.

Police report shows fall in crime but concerns over anti-social behaviour

Filton's latest police update, presnted to the full council meeting, reveals a mixed picture for October, with overall crime figures down compared to the previous month but persistent issues around anti-social behaviour (ASB) and electric bikes

According to the report presented to the Community Engagement Forum, 62 crimes were recorded in Filton up to 22 October, a notable drop from 102 offences in September. However, police noted that crime levels remain higher than the same period last year.

Anti-social behaviour remains a priority, particularly in and around Elm Park, where incidents linked to electric bikes continue.

or particularly in and around Elm Park, where incidents linked to electric bikes continue. Officers report that riders often leave the area at speed when approached, and additional measures are being taken to identify those involved. ASB concerns around shops on Gloucester Road North in Northville are also

being monitored, with trading standards expected to provide an update.

Officers also delivered talks at Filton Hill School and Springfields supported living, and held a bike-marking event at SGS College alongside a discussion on hate crime.

The breakdown for October shows 31 offences of violence against the person, 12 cases of arson and criminal damage, and 8 theft offences

Burglary figures fell to just two recorded incidents, and a suspect was recently arrested for theft in Filton and linked to other offences in neighbouring areas. Police continue to urge residents to report suspicious activity, particularly individuals trying car doors.

With arrests made for 10 offences in the past 28 days and ongoing community engagement, the Beat Team says it remains focused on tackling ASB and reducing crime across Filton.

Elm Park Leisure Centre shows strong growth and community impact

Elm Park Leisure Centre has reported significant progress in its latest update, highlighting improved financial performance, increased memberships, and expanded community offerings since its relaunch earlier this year.

Financial turnaround

The centre's income has grown steadily from £1,593 in May to a forecasted £52,390 for September, despite initial exceptional costs for statutory compliance and remedial works. These included upgrades to plant room electricals and gas boilers, as well as enhanced marketing efforts.

Membership and lessons on the rise

Health and fitness memberships have increased by 127 active members in the past month, contributing to a total membership base of 600 and generating £19,168 in recurring income. Swimming lessons have also seen strong uptake, with 74 participants in September and a total swim school enrollment of 413, adding £13,216 in recurring income.

Community engagement and programming

The centre has introduced new group exercise classes, including 19 virtual and 21 live sessions, alongside promotional campaigns such as "Join for £10" and free 3-day passes. These efforts have boosted engagement and usage across all facilities.

Additional income streams

The café and pay-and-play swimming options have seen notable growth, with combined income rising from £4,121 in June to £9,145 in September, marking a £5,024 increase.

Looking ahead

With a strengthened team, including a new operations manager and swim manager, Elm Park Leisure Centre is poised to continue its upward trajectory, offering diverse programs and improved facilities for Filton residents.

Opportunity to support residents in Filton with energy advice



Filton Town Council recently heard from Retrofit West, an organisation committed to helping households improve energy efficiency and reduce carbon emissions.

The presentation outlined the benefits of retrofitting homes, from simple insulation measures to installing renewable technologies such as solar panels and heat pumps. These improvements can help residents cut energy bills while contributing to local and national net-zero targets.

Retrofit West have suggested that a community event could be arranged in the new year. The idea, still at an early stage, would involve setting up an advice stall at the Elm Park Leisure Centre café, offering residents practical guidance on home energy improvements.

There is the possibility of inviting other organisations, such as Bristol Energy Network and the Centre for Sustainable Energy (CSE), to provide a broader range of expertise. Retrofit West highlighted similar initiatives already underway, including funding provided to Southmead Development Trust to train staff at the Greenway Centre to advise on energy efficiency.

At this stage, discussions are ongoing, and no date has been confirmed.

Filton Town Council is considering how best to promote any future event through local newsletters and Filton Voice to ensure strong community engagement.

With energy costs and sustainability high on the agenda, the council sees potential in working with Retrofit West and partners to help residents make informed choices about reducing energy use and improving comfort at home.



Report reveals main causes for surge in fly-tipping

By Alex Seabrook, LDRS reporter Five main areas have been identified as contributing to the prolonged rise of fly-tipping in South Gloucestershire.

This summer councillors sounded the alarm as piles of rubbish are being left across the district and called for an investigation into the root-causes of why people fly-tip.

Stoke Gifford was identified as one of the areas with the highest level of fly-tipping.

Councillors passed a motion in July, calling on the government to change the law so that money raised from prosecuting fly-tippers gets reinvested back into the area. The motion also led to a rootcause analysis, which the scrutiny commission was due to discuss on Wednesday, November 5.

A report to the scrutiny commission said: "Fly-tipping continues to pose a serious and escalating challenge in South Gloucestershire, with far-reaching environmental, financial, and social consequences. Fly-tipping incidents have shown a fluctuating but overall upward trend between 2019 and 2024, with notable hotspots in both urban fringes and rural lanes."

One contributing factor is access and affordability. The

four household waste recycling centres in the district — in Little Stoke, Mangotsfield, Thornbury and Yate — are only open from 8.30am to 4.30pm every day. People without cars cannot book a slot to visit a recycling centre, and anybody visiting on foot or by bicycle has to call or email the council to arrange a visit.

Another factor is a lack of awareness of legal disposal routes and potential penalties. Residents might not realise that arranging for a man in a van to take away their waste could result in that getting fly-tipped. Leaving unwanted items where they could be taken by others can also end up getting left on the side of the road for weeks.

Few people get prosecuted for fly-tipping in South Gloucestershire. While the council often talks about the successful prosecutions of criminals caught dumping waste, government statistics show the majority of fly-tipping incidents go unpunished in the district. In 2023–24, 2,171 incidents were recorded. But there were only 18 prosecutions and 15 fixed penalty notices.

"Commercial waste mismanagement" was also identified. Rogue traders and unlicensed waste carriers operate in South Gloucestershire, cold calling and advertising on social media to take rubbish away. Lastly, the rising cost of living and expensive costs of legitimate waste disposal are contributing to the increase in fly-tipping. This affects both residents and commercial waste.

The 2,171 figure is a whopping increase of 72 per cent compared to a decade ago. Spikes were

seen during the pandemic and at the brunt of the cost of living crisis. Last year two thirds of incidents were household waste, with construction and demolition waste coming in second.

As well as looking at the causes of fly-tipping, the report also considered six challenges facing the council in tackling the issue. Hazardous waste, such as asbestos, is expensive for people to dispose of within the rules and also costly for the council to clear up if left on the side of the road. This also presents a risk to the public in the meantime.

The report said court sentences "don't recognise the seriousness of fly-tipping". A recent prosecution led to a £180 fine, £100 costs and £80 victim surcharge, which "in no way reflected the nature of the offending nor the resources involved in investigating the offence".

Enforcement is not a statutory service, unlike other services the council provides. Council staff are "largely reactive rather than focusing on preventative measures and education".

And lastly, organised crime is a challenge facing the council. Rogue waste carriers and criminal enterprises are "profiting from large-scale flytipping".

Homes hit as garden waste fees rocket by 19 per cent

By Adam Postans, LDRS reporter Garden waste collection charges for South Gloucestershire residents are set to rocket by 19 per cent from April.

The council is proposing a hike from £63 to £75 "to continue to cover the costs of providing the service".

It comes despite fees doubling from £30 to £60 in 2024 which came with a pledge from South Gloucestershire Council leaders at the time that future increases would go up only by the rate of inflation, which currently stands at less than four per cent.

In its public consultation seeking people's views on a range of cuts and ways to increase income in its 2026/27 budget, the authority said: "Wherever possible, our focus is that those who are in a more fortunate position and can best afford it



should be making the largest contribution.

"However, we are limited by what we can do locally, and we await an update from Central Government on the financial settlement for the year ahead, which will clarify our financial position.

"Historically, charges for services like green waste collections have been much lower in South Gloucestershire than in other parts of the country – and far below the costs of delivering them.

"However, with more constrained council finances, it feels unfair to continue to subsidise services like these which the council is not required to provide, where there are alternative companies in the private sector providing a service.

"We have therefore changed our approach to set fees at a fair level, which helps cover our costs, so we can prioritise funding towards essential support like social care for the vulnerable.

"We are proposing to increase the annual fee for our green waste collections from £63 to £75."



Greenfingers... the Alan Titchmarsh column

He's a magnificent broadcaster, gifted gardener, brilliant author and all-round horticultural visionary. This month, Alan Titchmarsh talks about fine festivities in our gardens.

Christmas has a funny way of creeping into the garden. It starts with a string of subtle, seductive fairy lights over the porch and, before you know it, you've got a 12ft inflatable reindeer hanging from the rooftop!

Now, I'm all for a bit of sparkle, and if kids are present, there's arguably no sight more exciting than gazing out on the garden on Christmas Eve with the expectancy that Santa and his reindeer will soon be laying tracks across the lawn (they can't land on the roof because of that inflatable!).

However, where the outdoor festive feel is concerned, I think the garden deserves something subtle, classy, and in keeping with the season.

Last year, I took a wander down the path on Christmas Eve and realised that the holly bush by the gate was doing all the work on its own. A few scarlet berries, glinting in the frost, looked more authentic than anything I could plug into a socket. It made me think: why not let the plants take centre-stage?

A sprig of rosemary tucked into a wreath gives a waft of scent every time you pass the door. Ivy trails, woven around lanterns, bring an old-fashioned charm. Even crab apples left on bare branches can look like baubles against a wintry backdrop.

The trick is to decorate by using what the garden is already offering. One December, I trimmed a few twigs of dogwood and popped them in a jug on the windowsill. The red stems against a backdrop of white fairy lights felt so simple, but visitors thought I'd been terribly clever. Really, it was the dogwood doing all the heavy lifting.

Also, it doesn't have to solely be about natural elements. Some old blocks of wood painted to look like presents



can be a nice addition to a flowerbed. Consider as well placing red candles in terracotta plant pots for a warm festive glow.

Ultimately though, this Christmas, instead of filling every corner with tinsel, I'll let the garden do its quiet magic a partnership of light, leaf, and a touch of imagination. After all, even in midwinter, nature knows how to throw a party.

Paul Hollywood's fruit rolls can be made ahead then heated up before adding a glossy glaze and citrus icing, making them the perfect morning treat for Christmas Day.

Method

- 1. Put the flour and 1tsp salt into a large bowl. Make a well in the centre and add the yeast. Meanwhile, warm the milk and butter in a pan until the butter melts and the mixture is lukewarm. Add the milk mixture and egg to the flour mixture and stir until the contents come together as a soft dough (add extra flour if you need to).
- 2. Tip the dough onto a well-floured surface. Knead for 5 mins, adding more flour if necessary, until the dough is smooth, elastic and no longer sticky.
- 3. Lightly oil a bowl with the vegetable oil. Place the dough in the bowl and turn until covered in oil. Cover the bowl with cling film and set aside in a warm place for 1 hr or until doubled in size. Lightly grease a baking sheet and set aside.

- **4.** For the filling, knock the dough back to its original size and turn out onto a lightly floured surface. Roll it into a 1cm-thick rectangle. Brush all over with the melted butter, then sprinkle over the sugar, cinnamon and fruit.
- **5.** Roll up the dough into a tight cylinder, cut into 9 x 4cm slices and position on the prepared baking sheet, leaving a little space between. Cover with a tea towel and set aside to rise for 30 mins.
- **6.** Heat oven to 190°C/170°C fan/gas mark 5. Bake the buns for 20-25 mins or until risen and golden brown. Meanwhile, melt the glaze sugar with 4 tbsp water until syrupy.
- 7. Remove from oven and glaze. Set aside to cool on a wire rack. Once cool, mix the zest and icing sugar with about 2 tbsp water to drizzle over the buns. Serve.

- 500g strong white flour, plus extra for dusting
- 7g sachet fast-action dried yeast
- · 300ml milk
- 40g unsalted butter, softened at room temperature
- · 1 egg
- · Vegetable oil, for greasing

- · 25g unsalted butter, melted
- · 75g soft brown sugar
- · 2tsp ground cinnamon
- · 100g dried cranberries
- · 100g chopped dried apricot

· 50g caster sugar

- · Zest of a lemon



This free community event is spreading joy and brightness in the town as well as raising funds for the North Bristol & South Glos foodbank through the refreshment stops.


